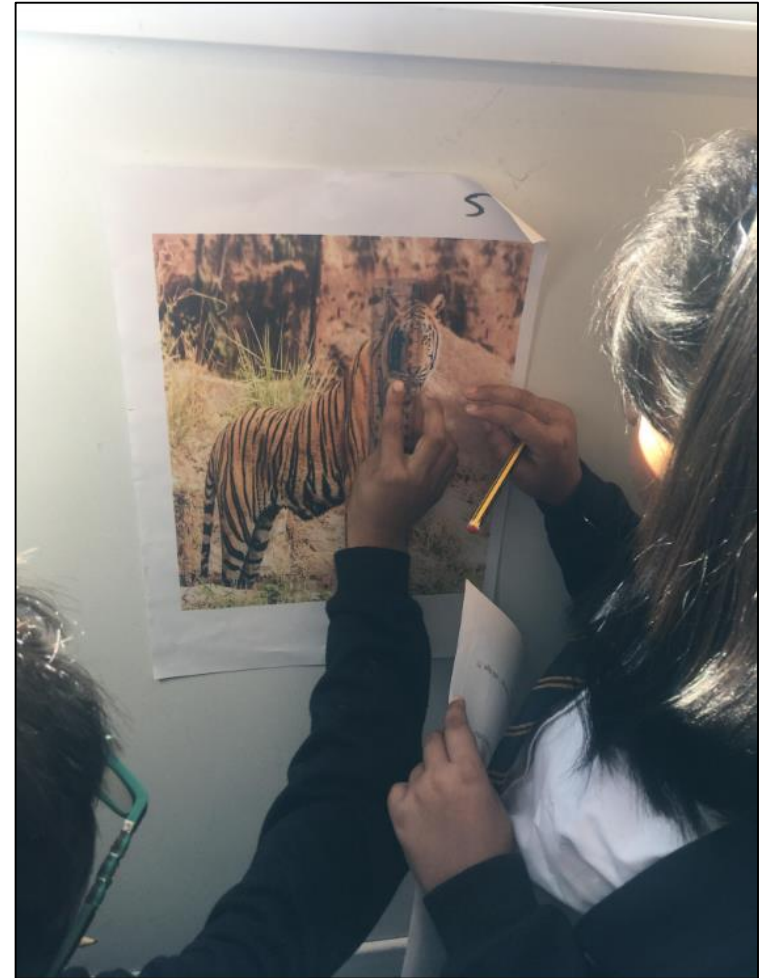


## Year Three – Animal Kingdoms

We have had a wonderful start to the year in Year 3, with the children acquiring a wide array of new information and knowledge based on our animal kingdom topic, tigers. Year 3 children used the marvellous poem 'The Dancing Tiger' by Malachy Doyle as inspiration to create their own riveting poems. Our inquisitive mathematicians were exposed to different units of measurements to compare the length, height and weight of tigers in the dense jungle. In Geography, we delved deeper into the everyday lives of tigers, investigating and locating the habitats of tigers, and how these big cats have adapted to such environments. In Science, the children learned about food chains and the tigers place within the food chain. The children were intrigued to learn that the tiger is very much at the top of this.
